And of course, each regional magazine adds local information to the official announcements that come from Rotary World Headquarters.

So perhaps Magazine Month is worth more than a passing thought. No other organization can boast a similar network of magazines throughout the world.

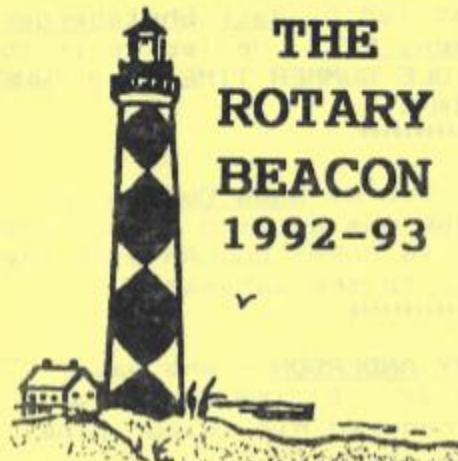
