NC Seafood Festival Second Largest in State

Seafood Festival Attracts 150,000 People And Pumps 32 Million into Local Coffers

Herb Phillips had the program last week. His guest speaker was Stephanie McIntyre, Director of the Seafood Festival. Stephanie, who has been involved with the Seafood Festival for the past 11 years, presented a general overview of the festival and how well it fared this year. Stephanie said that over 150,000 people attended the festival...not the largest crowd ever...that honor belongs to 2009...but still a great turnout...probably as many as the town can comfortably handle. And with so many visitors staying for the entire three days, about 32 million dollars were pumped into the local economy. Not bad for a weekend. The North Carolina Seafood Festival is the second largest festival in the state...second only to Ashville.

Money from the Seafood Festival helps the city and county in many ways. Some of the money is given to students in the form of scholarships and all the civic organizations receive a share for their efforts...and of course businesses benefit by the influx of tourists during the first weekend of October.

Stephanie said there was one glitch this year. "The wet weather caused a delay in setting up the tents. Everyone had to pitch in at the last moment to have the festival ready for Friday, opening day."

Stephanie thanked the Morehead City Evening Rotary Club for manning the drink booths for the past 20 years. "Without volunteers," she said, "we could not operate. It is a great service you do for the community."


TONIGHT'S PROGRAM
