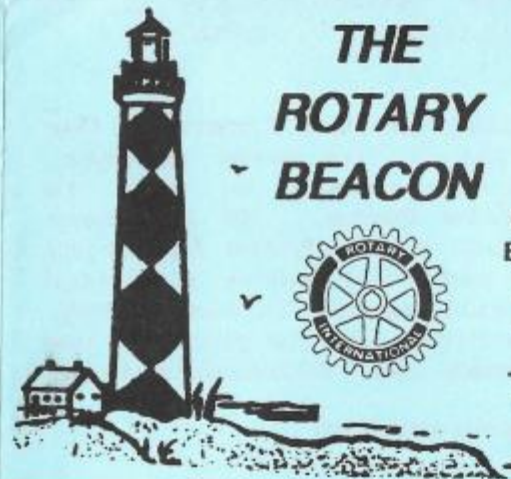
Have we been guilty? Let's find out rather than let anyone feel left out. That is the way strangers become friends. That's the Rotary way.

Michael Oyola was in charge of the September 10 Meeting. Jim Gregson, World Community Service Committee Chairperson and Paul Boone, Committee Member, presented a most informative program on "HEIFER PROJECT INTERNATIONAL" and how we can develop an ongoing project. (Our Board of Directors have already voted their approval.)

HPI is a nonprofit, ecumenical organization helping alleviate world hunger, one family at a time. It is governed by a volunteer board of directors representing 14 church agencies and a cross section of the private and public sectors.

About 50 percent of it's contributed income comes from churches, 25 percent from individuals, and the rest from foundations, corporations and government grants. Approximately 75 percent of this income goes directly to board approved projects in all parts of the world and the U.S. where the needs are most critical. \$500 ---- could help provide a heifer that produces 2.5 gallons of milk a day plus the possibility of a calf each year.

OUR PANCAKE SUPPER around November 1st will be to try to raise the \$500 to purchase this cow. More details will follow at a later date.
