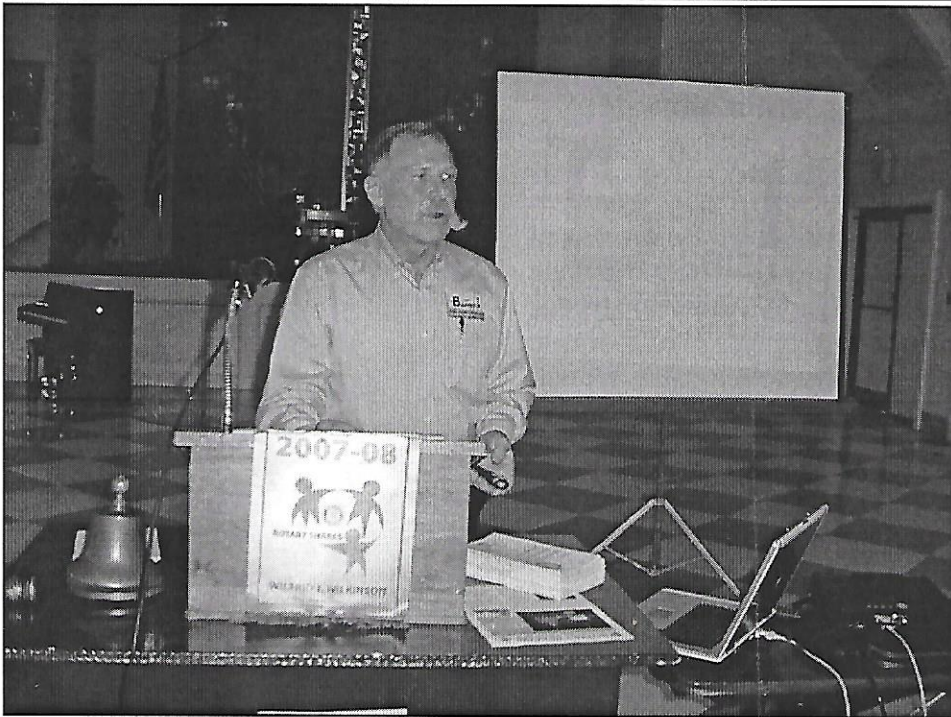

Speaker Praises Nature's Most Commonly Used Building Material

"Concrete," said Richard Koon, "is integral to our lives. It is everywhere we go. The only other material used more frequently than concrete is water. Twelve billion tons a year are used in building and construction. That is a lot of concrete. It is a renewable resource and an incredible building product. 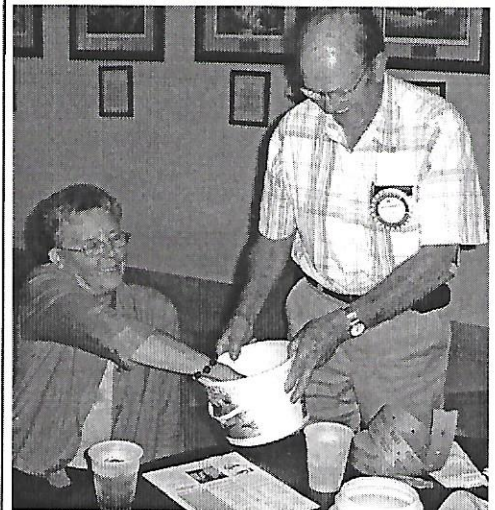

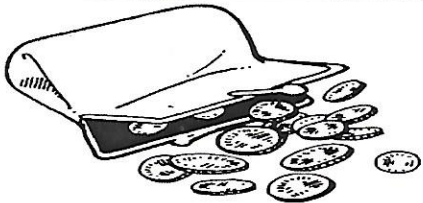
READERS' FORUM

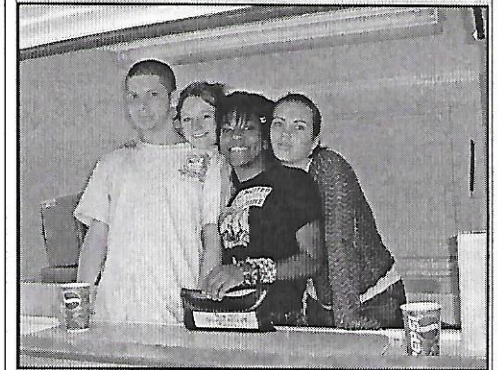
See Bet Dowty tonight to sign up to work the drink concession booths at the Seafood Festival. Every Rotarian is needed to cover the four booths.
